Ordination & Induction of Michael McMullin

In the last newsletter the vacancy update finished with: “*Session will meet shortly to discuss the nomination and then the congregation will be informed of the nominee’s name and the date for preaching.*”

As many of you will know, Michael preached for the vacancy in November and was overwhelmingly accepted by the congregation. A removal date in January was proposed for the family to arrive, but this had to be postponed as we became aware that the national church had decreed that all manse had to have an energy efficiency rating of “C” or above. Our manse is rated “D”.

To cut a long story short, since then the Manse has had a flat section of the roof replaced as it had started leaking, and, after considering multiple options, Session chose to place solar panels in the garden as they would bring the rating well into the “C” band.

So, the roof works are completed, and the solar panels will be installed in the second week of March which only leaves us with the task of tidying up the manse thereafter.

The Presbytery of Perth is responsible for setting the date for Michael’s Induction and Ordination and the Presbytery Clerk has now confirmed that this will take place on the evening of Thursday 23rd April 2026. We are delighted that we can now eagerly anticipate Michael and Jana’s arrival!

Whether you are a member, an adherent or someone simply interested in the life and work of our church and community, please put this date in your dairy – and do come along and support us as we formally welcome Michael as our new minister.

Meantime, we give thanks to Brian as he has been so willing to remain as our Interim Moderator and Locum for the extended period. Our thanks also go to Susan Whiteford and her team as they have worked to get us to point where the manse is ready for occupation.

Please keep these matters in your thoughts and prayers – and watch out on our website and Facebook page for further details.

From the Session Clerk: Our Church's Life and Work



In May 2023, the congregation voted to move to a model of governance known as The Unitary Constitution. Working Groups were formed with membership of each group open to all church members **and others** with each group able to co-opt anyone with a particular skill and interest – either for a short time, or a longer period.

This way of working has been operating for almost two years now and has, by and large, been very successful in engaging more people in the life and work of the church. A very big ‘thank you’ is due to those who convene these groups and to those who volunteered to work as part of each team. They have achieved much and made a big difference to our capacity to “get things done”!

Circumstances change though and some people have felt the need to step back from participation in these groups, so now it would be good if others were willing to take a turn at supporting a group. This can be for either a short time for a specific project or piece of work or for a longer period to provide ongoing support. You do not have to be a church member.

Is this you?

Overseen by Session, there is the Leadership Group which consists of office bearers and the convenors of each Working Group. The Leadership Team is responsible for overseeing and managing the life and work of the church by supporting both the Kirk Session and the Working Teams.

Which group would you like to find out more about?

The Worship Group has overall responsible for all forms of worship within and beyond the church family, as the National and local church reduces its ministerial capacity. Its work should support the minister in the style, content and planning of worship.

The Finance & Stewardship Group has overall responsible for the monitoring, controlling, and reporting of all income and expenditure. It should keep before the congregation the financial needs of the church and promote ways in which members can be encouraged in all aspects of Christian Stewardship.

The Fabric Group has overall responsibility for the care and maintenance of the properties of the congregation.

The Mission & Outreach Group has overall responsibility for developing and implementing (with others) a practical and achievable mission for the church.

The Pastoral Care Team has overall responsibility to offer care and support to others, in the knowledge of being loved themselves by God and in the hope of sharing that love with them.

The Communications Group has overall responsibility for promoting and supporting the congregation's communication links, internally and externally.

In addition, we have teams of people who undertake “Door Duties”, welcoming folks into our worship and supporting weddings and funerals, or who provide refreshments after Sunday Worship or who work on our sound team. This is about to become our Audio Visual Team!

If you already serve on one of these groups, thank you! If not, please do seriously consider where you can offer your talent, skills or experience. At a time when we look forward to our new minister's arrival, we need to be as strong a church as possible to carry out our mission in our community.

As a 'well kent' face around the church, what is your current role?

I am the convenor of the Communications Working Group. I prepare the Pew Leaflet each week, and also the PowerPoint files for projection of the hymns and other parts of the service, and an intimations file to highlight some of the pew leaflet items. In addition the Communications WG was instrumental in upgrading the church printer and some years ago, as Clerk to the Deacons' Court of Blairgowrie Parish Church, I was involved in looking into the possibility of projection in the Church. This didn't happen until after the Covid lockdown when we were advised not to share hymn books and we started projection using a temporary system. Since then, we have continued to use this method—although it is about to change with the arrival of our new AV system.

***How long have you been attending or involved with this church?***

We - that is, my wife Ellen and our two children - since October 1980. Ellen suggested that since we were expecting the children to go to Sunday School, then I should attend too. Until then, I had been a regular attender at St John's in Perth, since childhood with my parents.

What do you like about your job the most?

Knowing that what I do helps others worship God.

There are some large boxes in the pews behind you. Can you tell us what these are for?

These boxes are of two types, those that have been there for some time, and those that arrived more recently. A few years ago boxes of Church Records were unearthed from storage in the church; some from St Andrew's Church, and some from St Mary's - South and brought 'up the hill' following the Union and the formation of Blairgowrie Parish Church in 2002. It is required by Church Law that many of these documents (including very old Session minutes, etc.) are sent to '121' in Edinburgh and they will then be sent to the National Archives. Our plan has been to look at them before sending them off, which is why they are where they are.

The big boxes that arrived on Friday 13th February are for the new A/V system. The current projectors will be replaced by two large monitors fixed to the walls, and a slightly smaller one fixed to the Gallery and facing the Communion Table. We are also getting Wi-Fi access throughout the whole church and halls/meeting rooms to help with printing, school services, hall lets, and possibly Messy Church and other youth ministry. There will also be a fixed projector in the Upper Hall, with a large screen. All the necessary equipment is currently in boxes ready for installation in March.

Do you have a story about what God has done in your life?

In the late 1990s, having retired, I was doing my training as a Reader in the Church of Scotland and someone prayed for me in tongues at an Alpha Course Away Day in Pitlochry. Another time I was at a training day for an Alpha Conference and we were asked to go to the back of the room if we wanted personal prayer. I could not get out of my seat because of others, but a Methodist Minister came over the pews behind me with a verse: Psalm 37:4 'Seek your happiness in the Lord, and He will give you your heart's desire.' I feel that this has proved to be completely true.

Genealogy. My mother was Canadian. Her mother was American, although she left America when her father returned to Peterborough in Canada with his German wife. My maternal grandfather was Canadian of English origins. All Methodists. My mother became an Anglican and then joined the Church of Scotland when she came over to marry my father. Genealogy and my preaching have led to me collecting Communion Tokens from the Churches where I have preached, or where I have a family connection.

I also collect different stoneware and glass Victorian ginger beer bottles from Begg's of Bolton. This was one of Ellen's ancestors. These bottles range from stoneware with cork, through the torpedo shape to Codd bottles (with the marble), and then to early screw top bottles. Begg's prize-winning ginger beer was exported around the world.



I am a member of Strathmore Speakers Club too. I joined in 1996 when I started my Readership training, and I am currently the Secretary.

You are obviously a very busy person. Is there anything else you would like to tell us that we might not know about you?

As a Reader in the Church of Scotland I am sometimes asked to take services. I have taken services in over 15 different churches in the former Presbytery of Dunkeld and Meigle. It is a particular privilege to take a service here in Blairgowrie Parish Church.

Fabric Working Group:



The fabric group has continued to inspect the Manse weekly and before Christmas the leak that had been showing in the hall was seen to be getting worse. A slater was called and we found that the manse had a flat roof (who knew?) and a previous repair had been effected with nails! This was where the water was pouring into the loft. Towels and mats were used to hold the water and the leak was contained. Quotes were obtained which ranged from £2,760 to £11,000. We accepted the lower quote and the repair was completed in two days in early February (as

soon as the rain stopped for long enough for the contractor to do it).

To meet the Church of Scotland's rule for Manses to have an EPC rating of C, solar panels are being installed in the garden of the manse in the 2nd week of March. Seven panels will raise the Manse rating from D to C rating and it is hoped that most of the cost will be covered by a grant from Presbytery.


The Heating Saga: The heating continues to keep us busy. In early February we called on Darren (a heating engineer who used to work for Haddow) to see if there was a reason that the sanctuary wasn't getting as warm as it had previously. He found that a valve had been altered and heat was going backwards into the hall. He adjusted it and it has helped but as we were lacking sun for all January it has been difficult to raise the temperature. A week later there was no electrical power in the boiler room, a mystery to everyone as nothing on the circuit had tripped. It turned out to be a faulty control switch which the electrician replaced for us.

All these things have taken time and money, but it is hoped to get on with the main action for the year, to replace the hall windows. This is a major job and requires planning permission.

The Communications Working Group



Exciting News! Last Friday saw the delivery of much of the equipment for the audio-visual (AV) upgrade with installation planned for the second and third weeks of March. It is interesting to remember that this project began some considerable time ago, developing more fully after the Covid lockdown with the projection of hymns and other information onto screens as well as filming of services. The planned new system will include wi-fi installation throughout the building and a Live-Streaming facility. A full upgrade of the audio system is also included. It was a tight fit to get the new, very large screens up



the ramp, through the back door, and along to the North Transept, but we managed, and plans are in hand to remove part of two pews to allow installation of the control desk and equipment cupboard in front of the current projection table. This will ensure space for two or three operators, and wheelchair access too. Training will be provided along with the installation and we are aiming for 3 or 4 teams of three to operate the new system to avoid a too heavy burden on the operators. The timing seems to be perfect as the installation will be complete and we

will have a couple of weeks to practice before the Presbytery Service of Ordination and Induction for Michael in April.

We are very grateful that that total cost of this project, about £50,000, has been fund-raised or donated by members, so there has been no need to dip into Church Funds except possibly for the pew removal.

Meanwhile, the Communications Working Group continues to engage with various other aspects of church life and mission by producing pew leaflets and slides for each worship service, by producing the church newsletter, by making use of social and other media to 'meet' the wider community, and by offering its support with any activities of other Working Groups.

Café Church/ Early Morning Service



Early morning services take place on the first Sunday of each month as a cafe style church, with breakfast (for example, bacon rolls, mini sausages, granola pots and lots of fruit, with tea, coffee or juice) served from 9.15am. The Finance and Stewardship Group

At time of writing, the accounts for the end of year have been finalised and await approval from the independent examiner. All going well I hope to be in a position to present the Year End Accounts sometime towards the end of March.



Meantime we have reached our target of £50,000 for the Audio-Visual System and having paid a 50% deposit can progress with the installation.

Some last-minute repairs/improvements had to be done to the Manse prior to Michael moving in. This amounted to around £2800 for roof repairs and a further £6,19.00 for Solar Panels. We expect the latter to attract some grant funding

After drawing £30,000 from our Growth Fund to ensure sufficient available funds for the aforementioned expenditure, we are at present sitting with circa £30,000 in our Treasurers Account , £20,000 in a Commercial Call(small interest-bearing account) in the Bank of Scotland and £159,000 in our Growth Fund. Whilst these figures seem quite healthy, we must, of course, not lose sight of future possible repair bills, maintenance costs and increased running costs.


