

# **Beyond Easter!**

Undoubtedly, spring time always brings with it a great amount of anticipation leading up to Easter. Even for those who are "*Christmas and Easter*" church-goers, or for those who simply sit at home and dream of Easter baskets, chocolate rabbits, and coloured eggs, anticipating Easter, on the one hand, is like waiting for



the door to finally be unlocked, unhinged and opened onto a green spring field of sunshine and colour. On the other hand, Easter is stepping out onto that field and closing the door behind on the long, cold, dreary winter.

Yet, for many, the day comes and goes and then what? Easter is over again until next year. In some parts of the world, winter still hangs above, and the grey of death has not given way to the springtime. The chocolate is eaten, the celebrations are over, and everything seems to return to normal. All that anticipation ends in just one day—with grand festivities and powerful sermons, and perhaps with even a first playful egg-roll in the springtime grass—and then it's over. Or is it?

The celebration of Easter is insignificant if the celebrations do not point to the continuing reality of the Risen Lord. Indeed, in many church traditions, the season of Easter which lasts until Pentecost asks this very question. *How do we know the continuing presence of the risen Lord in our daily lives?* Indeed, how do we? Is it simply the annual remembrance of a historic event from long ago?

If we're honest, many of us do wonder what difference the resurrection has made in the practical realities of our lives. We still argue with our spouses and loved ones; we still have children who go their own way. We have difficulties at work or at school. We still see a world so broken by warfare, selfish greed, oppression and sin. Like the two men on the road to Emmaus recounting the events surrounding Jesus, perhaps we wonder aloud: **"But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel"** (Luke 24:21a). Things seem pretty much as they were before Easter Sunday, and the reality of our same old lives still yearns for healing, salvation and hope.

This is often the way we feel if we have only understood resurrection as an event long past that only speaks to a future yet to come. We feel this way if we do not connect Jesus's prayer for God's will to be done **"on earth as it is in heaven"** with the reality of the cry, **"He is risen, as he said."** The glimpse into

the kingdom of God that we get in the life and ministry of Jesus is confirmed through the resurrection. New creation, new life, resurrected living is now a possibility for those who believe, trust and follow Jesus. The risen Jesus told his followers, **"As the Father has sent me,** *I also send you***"** (John 20:21).

My friend, let me remind you that Jesus' resurrection is not a promise for escape from the world, or a life free from trouble. We know it isn't! But rather it commands those who are Christians, to you and to me, to those would remember his resurrection to be his 'faithful and courageous' agents in the world.

We have a wonderful message of hope and life which only God through Christ provides. He sends us out with the extraordinary news that the dead can be raised to new life, for death and evil do not have the last word! Heaven is a certainty and Easter reminds us that one day we will be with Him and with all those who in faith have trusted in His name. We are sent out beyond Easter Sunday into the future because everything has changed. As we live into and out of the resurrection, we demonstrate the continuing presence of the risen Lord in our lives and in this world.

Therefore, wherever we go in life, and wherever God leads us in the future, let us never forget that Easter gives us hope beyond today and a seasonal celebration. The reality of Easter is a promise of God delivered and guaranteed by God through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ for every day of the year and beyond!

May your heart be filled with peace, joy and hope as you remember Jesus' love for you and the eternal life won for you through His resurrection. Never doubt it!

# **Our Unitary Constitution and Working Groups**

Following the dedication service on the 1<sup>st</sup> October, the Unitary Constitution is now in operation. The Working Groups have all called meetings and have begun to develop their strategies and priorities. It is expected that future issues of the church magazine will contain reports of Working Group activities and these will overtake some regular items, such as the Property Update or Treasurer's report. This issue of the magazine begins that process.

The Working Groups are:

Worship: supporting and developing all forms of worship within and beyond the church family.

Fabric: care and maintenance the heritable and moveable properties of the congregation.

### Fabric Working Group: Report

A pre-application is being prepared to submit to the Council to obtain agreement that the windows in the hall can be replaced. We have to apply for planning as the hall is in a conservation area and we would like to put in double glazed windows. New blinds have been fitted in the hall and these would be transferred to the new windows. The Fabric Working Group is looking for curtains to be hung on the rails to reduce the echo in the hall, not to cover the windows!



The motion sensor light at the entrance to lower hall has found to be faulty and will be replaced soon.

The Fabric Group has a schedule of small jobs that need to be completed around the Church and hall and intend to meet each Saturday at 10.30 am for an hour and a half throughout March, to complete as many of these small tasks as possible. Jobs on the list so far include: rub down the railings and paint: fill in the gaps on the steps: renew the paint on the steps: replace worn out carpet on the stairs to the sanctuary:



repair the seats in the side chapel: clean the woodwork on the pulpit. If you can help there will be a job for you and you will be very welcome to join the working party. Please wear old clothes and working gloves and sign up for a job.

The seats in the side chapel have been showing signs of significant wear for some time and work has now started on replacing the seat upholstery. More material has been purchased to replace all the seats and this will be completed over time.

### Finance and Stewardship Working Group.

### **Financial Overview:**

2023 presented another challenging year financially. We undertook significant improvements to the church and halls, including installing new boilers and painting the halls, which totalled nearly £40,000. Fortunately, we were able to use investments from 121 George Street to cover these costs. However, these resources are finite, and unexpected situations could arise in the future.

Excluding these major projects, the church's day-to-day operations broke even. This means we are not currently building up funds for future projects. Our income comes from several sources: Standing Orders, Free Will Offerings (which we are transitioning away from in favour of Standing Orders), open plate donations, and general donations. Unfortunately, due to an ageing congregation with fewer younger members joining, we anticipate a potential decline in this income source. Our other main income stream is hall rentals, which, thanks to our dedicated hall letting convenor, generates £6,000 annually.

# Challenges and Opportunities:

Beyond the declining income from donations, our ageing building requires increasingly expensive maintenance, particularly with regards to energy costs. While we don't expect major repairs on the scale of the past few years, future needs are inevitable. Meeting these challenges won't be easy. We are grateful for the generous contributions of many, but additional support is crucial. While we understand everyone faces financial pressures, especially in the current climate, we encourage those who donate via Standing Orders to consider reviewing and potentially increasing their contributions if they feel they can. The convenience of Standing Orders simplifies regular giving.

# **Positive Notes and Conclusion:**

Despite the challenges, we are financially stable and we have a well-maintained building. I extend my sincere gratitude to all who have generously contributed and supported the church throughout the past year. As we move forward, let's continue our good work together.

# The Communications Working Group

The Communications Working Group has overall responsibility for promoting and supporting the congregation's internal and external communication links. Reporting to Session as required, it will work to establish an effective communications strategy for all aspects of Church life and witness.



As such, we exist to support other Working Groups, as well as to undertake the weekly communication with the congregation via the Pew Leaflet, and the PowerPoint Files projected during services. We were, until recently, directly involved in producing a weekly report on the work of the Church for the '*Blairie*', and we hope this will be re-established because it is another way to reach our wider community. There are also reports in '*The Hub*' magazine, as well as the editing and producing of our own Church Magazine three times annually. We have supported other Working Groups by producing Hymn Sheets for outdoor events, including Christmas Praise in the Wellmeadow.

Since our first meetings, we have been looking at GDPR regulations as required by the Church of Scotland. We have undertaken a data audit that identifies how we store and distribute information, and we have produced an updated Data Protection Policy, Employee and Congregation Privacy Statements and an action plan of 'good practice'. One example of this relates to donation recording where neither the donor nor the amount donated needs to be openly discussed or recorded. The Treasurer and a few of his team will need to know and it may be necessary to record how much the donation was, but not to name the donor unless he/she wishes it. Perhaps more importantly though, it is clear that we need to establish safe methods to store and share information.

Some time ago we were told that our Xerox photocopier was to be phased out. The Communications Group considered replacement possibilities and eventually opted for an Epson ET-16600 Series machine, which can print in colour up to A3 in size, double sided, and relatively cheaply. This recommendation was put to Kirk Session, it was approved and it has been purchased. It is an ink-jet printer, so is better for the environment than either a laser printer or a toner photocopier. It uses ink tanks, rather than cartridges, so is easier to maintain as the casual user will not need to know about ink replacement, toner cartridges, etc. Meanwhile, we plan to produce a 'User Guide' to make this new machine more accessible, and to establish costs for non-church use so that it has the potential to support community organisations. We were able to purchase this machine due to donations from members of the congregation. Many thanks! Meanwhile, the old Xerox machine is still available for black and white work until the contract ends.

Our next priority will be to address the question of the Audio/Visual system, to establish whether there is any way it can be done in stages or to look for grants, so the work can be done sooner than will be achieved by fundraising alone. There is, of course, the risk that phased purchase will cost us more in the longer term but Live Streaming is a critical priority because just now the Session Clerk is required to spend several hours each Sunday afternoon editing and uploading the files to YouTube from the two mobile phones used to record the service. This cannot continue, yet we see the video worship as a very important part of our outreach, and the upgrade is what any incoming minister will now expect.

If you would like to get involved with the preparation of weekly PowerPoint files, and their projection, or the preparation and printing of the Pew Leaflet, then let us know. We are a relatively small group, but we hope to be able to help the other Working Groups achieve their goals.

My earliest memory of St Andrew's was attending infant Sunday School in what is now called the Upper Hall. As a toddler we attended at the same time as the Morning Service was taking place in the church itself. Later, the 5–11-year-olds attended the initial part of the "adults' service for around twenty minutes then departed up the steps to our Sunday School session.

If memory serves me correctly, we sat in the first six (!) rows of the church and heard an introductory hymn, the weekly intimations, a prayer (which seemed never-ending), and a children's address. After a dedicated children's hymn, we departed upstairs. The first minister I recall, was Rev. Howieson who had come from Glasgow and had baptised me in the church some years before. If the candidate is allowed to proceed, then the decision is taken to allocate the candidate to one of the four ministries in the Church of Scotland; Fulltime Parish Ministry, Ordained Local Ministry, the Diaconate or Readership. I was pleased to be allocated to the Readership – I felt I

was being called to preach the Gospel and it was heartening that my mentors agreed with that.

My first placement was with Rev. Mary Haddow in Pitlochry and although I only had a short period with her due to her retiring through ill health, I really enjoyed working with Mary and the congregation and was sorry not to have had more time under her careful and thoughtful guidance.

The Rev. Penny Fraser stepped in to take over supervising my progress and again I felt blessed to be given the chance to work with such an experienced minister. The chance to take part in and lead worship in an iconic building as Dunkeld Cathedral was an opportunity not to be missed!

My final placement was with Rev. Mike Erskine in Alyth, another very experienced minister with a different style of preaching. Under Mike's supervision I covered all aspects of preparing and delivering prayers, readings, sermons and so covering all aspects of preaching. I was also pleased to be invited by Benjamin to take part in services here in Blairgowrie on some occasions.

There is one Preaching Assessment for the Readership and Mike and I agreed that I would undergo the assessment on 16<sup>th</sup> April in Alyth with two ministers from another Presbytery in attendance. As well as conducting the full service there, I had a conversation with Mike and the assessors after the service. It felt a bit like a job interview and there was a bit of nail biting going on but the outcome was positive!

There was plenty of support available from the Church of Scotland teams who manage the process, and the encouragement of friends was invaluable. But the biggest support came from Morag whose unstinting support— even when things didn't always go to plan— kept me going through the times when I questioned if I genuinely had a calling.
